Programs operating

- Sessional kindergarten – 15 hours per week, delivered as 30 hours per fortnight
Attendance patterns offered:
2 x full days Monday & Tuesday 8.30-3.15 PLUS alternate Friday mornings 8.30-11.30
OR
2 x full days Wednesday & Thursday 8.30-3.15 PLUS alternate Friday mornings 8.30-11.30

- Occasional Care Program
4 sessions (funded) per week for 2-4 year olds (not accessing any other Department for Education service)
- Bilingual support
As required
- Preschool support
Preschool support is allocated following a referral and assessment from Regional staff (e.g. disability Coordinator, Speech Therapist and Psychologist). Allocation of hours within the region is based on a priority of children's needs, and subject to funding.
- Full Day / Lunch care is part of our Kindergarten program Mondays to Thursdays.
- Transition /Information sessions
As part of the transition process, children attend two sessions in term 4. Parents are invited to stay for one of these sessions. Parents receive an enrolment package in Term 3
- Local Management
The responsibility of kindergarten management rests with the Director, supported by Governing Council and staff. An Annual General Meeting is held each year, where committee members are nominated and appointed. The kindergarten contracts the services of a financial support officer and participates in the Department for Education yearly audit.

 - Staff meet with the Director twice a year to review, plan and implement identified goals from the Quality Improvement Plan and Personal Development Plans and to receive feedback
- Access to special support staff
 - Referrals to Department for Education and private providers are sought in consultation with parents and staff. All referrals are subject to parent consent.

- We have links with other providers including Cora Barclay Centre and Women's and Children's Hospital.
- From time to time OT students from Uni SA work with small groups of children.
- Incursions with visiting performers.

5. Centre Facilities

- Buildings and grounds
The building dates back to 1935, as a purpose built kindergarten/ child care facility. It is an open plan design, light and airy with a large bay window. The centre has an office, mat area, storeroom, paint-washing sink, and Occasional Care has its own separate room and remodelled kitchen area [2017]. The kindergarten is air conditioned throughout. Children's bathroom and toilet facilities were extensively upgraded in 2018. The grounds consist of an upgraded swing area, play platform, large covered sand pit area, mud kitchen, water pump, "fairy" garden nook, a solid cubby house and a climbing tree. The old cedar tree provides charm and ample shade and a young golden elm helps completely shade the northern outside area.

7 Occasional Care children attend per session
